House Speaker 'Mr. Sam' Rayburn And Y-12er R. C. Herrell Recall Roane County Ties And Stories In Capitol Meetings

East Tennessee Area Birthplace Of Both

Few human ties are stronger—or closer—than those of a native Tennessean for his home state. That also goes for the ties with fellow natives of the state, particularly involving sectionalism where Tennesseans born in one certain county or "division" of the state will claim lifelong friendship and regard for others coming from the same part of the commonwealth.

Such ties have brought together in a firm friendship two highly divergent personalities. One is a Y-12 Chemical Operator—the other one of the highest officials in the United States government.

Their common ground? Both were born in nearby Roane County. The Y-12er is Richard Carl Herrell, of the Y-12 Alpha Four Cascade Operations Department—the other is Sam Rayburn, Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, who probably is better known as "Mr. Sam" and who while still retaining great pride in his Tennessee heritage, has for many years been a highly regarded citizen and congressman from Texas.

Kin Folks Close Friends

Their acquaintanceship began through contacts by both men with Roane County relatives. The Rayburn kin and the Herrell kin have been close friends for many years—and it was probably inevitable that a member of one family should say

to another—"When you go to Washington, don't fail to call on Mr. Sam, and tell him we sent you."

So, back in 1940, Herrell while on a visit to Washington did just that—called on Speaker Rayburn. It took the Roane County natives just a few minutes to recall how "Auntie So-and-So" and "Uncle So-and-So" did "such and such" and to swap other similar conversational tidbits. This original meeting led to others whenever the Herrells would visit Washington—and Mr. Sam never failed to find the time from his arduous duties to swap anecdotes with his fellow Roane Countian.

Booster For Oak Ridge

Herrell last week fondly—and proudly—recalled several of his talks with Speaker Rayburn. The Y-12er

pointed out that the Texan-transplanted from Tennessee—was "in on the ground floor" in the original discussions that led to the creation of Oak Ridge and its national defense role. Speaker Rayburn, along with the late Tennessee Sen. Kenneth McKellar, were among the strongest supporters of the Manhattan Project from the very start, and greatly responsible for locating it in East Tennessee. This interest has never decreased on the part of Speaker Rayburn, Herrell declared. The most recent meeting of the Y-12er and Speaker Rayburn was on August 15, of this year, when the accompanying photograph of the two was snapped by a photographer of The New York Times.

Moved To Texas When Young

"Mr. Sam" Rayburn was born on January 6, 1882, in Roane County—the exact site still being a matter of disagreement between present various residents there. His parents were W. M. and Martha Waller Rayburn. While the present speaker of the house was still young, the family moved to Texas—where "Mr. Sam" began his outstanding career.

His initial appearance in political circles was in the Texas legislature, where he served from 1907 through 1913. In 1913 he was elected to Congress—where he has been ever since and has served in practically every capacity he could be named to by appreciative colleagues.

First Served In 63rd

His first term was in the 63rd Congress—and the present term is No. 86. He was House Democratic Leader in the 75th, 76th and 77th Congressional sessions. During the 77th, 78th, 79th, 81st, 82nd, 84th and 85th sessions he was Speaker and also served as Democratic Leader in the 80th and 83rd sessions.

Speaker Rayburn was further honored by his party by being designated Permanent Chairman of the Democratic National Conventions of 1948, 1952 and 1956. He was Honorary Chairman of the 1960 convention.

Y-12er Richard Carl Herrell was born in Kingston, Roane County, on January 11, 1904, the son of Jeff and Lillie Herrell. He concluded his high school education in Roane County High School, Kingston, and later took University of Tennessee extension courses in electronics and electricity.

He first was employed in the Y-12 Plant on July 2, 1943, in the early days of the Manhattan Project. In 1947 he received a reduction in force, but returned to work on February 1, 1951. For approximately 10 years prior to his first employment in Y-12, he was with the Aluminum Co. of America at Alcoa, where he now lives.

Herrell says he makes about two or three trips annually to Washington—and even now is looking forward to his next journey to see the Texan he describes as a "great statesman."

Badge Exchange Plan To Be Same As July 1

Designation Of Portal Change Needed Early

Y-12ers are reminded that the first badge exchange for the new meter take-home badges is scheduled to begin on October 1. The same method used for the initial distribution of the new badges on July 1 will be used for this exchange. The badges of each employee will be placed in the self-service badge rack in badge number order at the perimeter portal designated by him on the last IBM card he filled out for that purpose.

For this second badge exchange, if any employee desires his new badge placed in a rack at a perimeter portal different from the one designated by him on the last IBM card submitted for the July 1 exchange, he must complete another IBM card and return it to the Security Department no later than September 16. Blank IBM cards, on which employees may designate the perimeter portal at which they desire their new badges to be placed for the October 1 badge exchange, are available at self-service badge racks, pay portals, guard posts and the Stores Department.

Several Y-12ers Participate In Giant Air Force-Army Maneuvers At Fort Bragg

Reservists Spend Two Weeks In Vital Action To Keep America Strong In Peace-Time Defenses

When the 316th Logistical Command of the U. S. Army Reserves took part in "Operation Bright Star" August 14 through 28 at Fort Bragg, N.C., several Y-12ers participated in the joint action by the U. S. Air Force and U. S. Army. The military unit is based in Knoxville.

The maneuvers saw 10,000 troops in the largest peace time single joint action since the close of World War II. Fort Bragg, the home of the famous 82nd Airborne Division, is near Fayetteville, N.C.

Sgt. Cleon Hartman, son of Orel Hartman, of the Mail Department, brought the above picture in from

summer camp complaining that Fort Bragg was nothing but sand and scrub pine, which sounds like a familiar tune from anybody who has ever even been near an army camp, particularly in the South.

In the August 20, 1958, edition of The Bulletin, a photograph of young Hartman, made in Ulm, Germany, was published. At that time he was on active duty with the 51st Infantry, U. S. Army. He had won his third straight battalion rifle range competition with the carbine and was presented a trophy by his battalion commander. He served 18 months in Germany.

Small Game Hunts Start This Month

East Tennessee Dates Listed By Commission

The hunting of small game on most of East Tennessee's wildlife management areas is set to get under way during September, according to Roy H. Anderson, chief of the game management division of State Game and Fish Commission. Areas and September opening hunt dates as listed by Chief Anderson follow:

Central Peninsula—Squirrel and grouse—September 1, 2, 3, 7, 9, 10, 28, 30 and October 1.

Andrew Johnson—Squirrel and grouse—September 7, 10, 14, 17, 21, 24, 28; October 1, 5, 8, 12, 15 and November 2, 5.

Ocoee—Squirrel, grouse, feral hog—September 22, 23, 24, 29, 30; October 1 and December 9, 10, 19, 20.

Tellico-WMA—Squirrel, grouse—September 23, 24, 26, 27; October 3, 4, 5, 6 and December 2, 3, 14, 15, 30, 31.

Cove Creek—Squirrel—September 15 through October 15.

Anderson said that area hunt permits will be required on all of the above listed areas except Cove.
