


Y-12 TEST ALARM SET SOMETIME JUNE 15-17

Air Horn Signal Will Be Checked For Efficiency

Employees Will Not Evacuate Buildings During Operation

Every Carbide employee in the Y-12 Plant Area is urged to be on the alert for a test of the recently established evacuation alarm signal which will be sounded sometime in the period from next Wednesday morning, June 15, to Friday night, June 17. The test in Y-12 is to be duplicated in the K-25 Plant and also at the Oak Ridge National Laboratory.

No Movement of Personnel

It is stressed that the test of the evacuation signal is merely that—a test, and that there will be no movement of personnel within the plant. The tests in the Oak Ridge Carbide installations are a part of a series being held in connection with Civil Defense nationwide tests, of efficiency of controls and communications.

In Y-12 the evacuation signal is to be sounded over the air horns and will consist of half-second blasts of the horn interrupted by half-second periods of silence. The alarm will give the effect of a series of "beep" signals and will last for three minutes. In buildings where public address systems are installed the loud speakers will carry word of the alarm test to employees.

No Advance Notice Coming

No advance information will be given on the exact time for the sounding of the evacuation alarm. This word will come from the Atomic Energy Commission in a message to the office of the Y-12 Plant Shift Superintendent and immediately on its receipt the alarm will be sounded.

The principal objective of the test is to ascertain how well the alarm signal can be heard in various parts of the Y-12 Plant Area, both inside and outside of buildings. A thorough survey will be made by the Plant Shift Superintendent's office after the test to determine its efficiency.

Radio Test Is Slated

In connection with the test, a Y-12 Guard Department radio car will be dispatched along a prescribed evacuation route in a test of radio communications to and from the plant. The car will proceed to a point about 10 miles away from the plant for this test.

Oak Ridge Squadron Of Civil Air Patrol Can Be Called 'Carbide's Own Air Force'

54 Of 60 Members Connected In Some Way With Company; Y-12 Man Is Commanding Officer

The Oak Ridge Squadron of the Civil Air Patrol can well be called "Carbide's Own Air Force" as 54 of its 60 members are employed or connected in some way with the Y-12 Plant, K-25 and the Oak Ridge National Laboratory—the three Carbide installations in Oak Ridge. The Civil Air Patrol is the only auxiliary air force in existence, being an arm of the United States Air Force and an important cog in the civil defense machinery of the nation.

Membership in the Civil Air Patrol is voluntary and is divided into two types. They are: senior members who must be more than 18 years of age and a citizen of the United States; and cadets, who must be from 15 to 18 years of age.

Varied Training Offered

Civil Air Patrol offers its senior members opportunities to train in aviation, military and related subjects, and perform practice missions.

Maj. Glenn T. McIntyre is Commander of Group IV of the Tennessee Wing, CAP, which includes squadrons at Bristol, Greeneville, Kingsport, Knoxville, Morristown, and Oak Ridge. Major McIntyre is Chief of the ORNL Guard Department. Carbide employees serving on his staff are Capt. George Hudson as Director of Communications from the K-25 Electrical Maintenance Department, and Capt. T. D. Napier as Executive Officer from Unit Operations Division, ORNL.

Y-12er Is Commander

The Oak Ridge Squadron, which was first organized in August, 1946, now is under the command of Capt. Lonnie A. Slover, with the Electrical Maintenance Department at Y-12. Four Carbide employees from K-25 serve on his staff. They are Sgt. Herman Queener, Director of Supplies from the Electrical Maintenance Department, Sgt. Ellen Queener, Public Information Officer; and Sgt. Harry Marshall, Operations Officer, both from the Maintenance Engineering and Methods Department; and Sgt. Ted Stapleton, Training Officer, from the

Safety Award Voting Continues This Week

Friday Deadline Set; Thermos Jug Popular

To give every Carbide employee in the Y-12 Plant Area eligible for individual safety awards an opportunity to take part in the vote for articles to be offered, the ballot will be published again this week in The Bulletin for the third and last time. It appears on Page Four.

Vacationers Are Benefitted

Because of vacations or sickness, some Y-12ers might not have had the opportunity to turn their ballots in before the previously set deadline of today, Wednesday, June 8. However, with the printing of the ballot again this week, the deadline has been extended for two more days with it being necessary that all votes be in the Y-12 Safety Department, Bldg. 9704-2, not later than Friday of this week, June 10.

Brisk balloting was recorded last week with 414 votes having been counted by Friday, June 3, at noon. In this voting the one-gallon Thermos jug proved the most popular with 45 ballots. The French fried potato cutter was next with 31 votes and the bench tool grinder was chosen by 30. The Stanley block plane was selected by 28. Tied at 22 votes each were the Dazey knife sharpener, home or automobile first aid kit and the alarm clock. The wall can opener was picked by 18 and the tackle box and hack saw were chosen by 16. The Paper-Mate Capri pen drew 14 votes to round out the top 11 articles.

After all the balloting is completed the Safety Department will use the results as a guide for selecting 11 articles to be offered as individual safety awards for the 15th Carbide Safety Period established in the Y-12 Plant Area. Eligible employees then will make their selection of a single article from this list.

Question: Is it better to borrow money from the Y-12 Employees Credit Union or cash in shares if emergency funds are needed?

Answer: This depends on different things. The time of year should always be considered. If you have money in the Credit Union as shares all year and in the latter part of the year funds are needed, it may be that the interest to be paid on money borrowed will be less than the dividend received by leaving the shares in the Credit Union until the end of the year. Remember, if shares are cashed before the end of the year the dividend is lost. Also, if only a short term loan is needed even early in the year, it may be better to leave the shares as they are. All of this depends on individual circumstances and employees of the Credit Union will be glad to assist in solving any such problems.

The Bombers added one win, a 11 to 2 triumph over the Wildcats, to share the runner-up spot. 
